

## IV. The financial value of states' arms exports

Official data on the financial value of states' arms exports in the years 2009–18 is presented in table 9.10. The data is taken from reports by—or direct quotes from—national governments. The stated data coverage reflects the language used by the original source. National practices in this area vary, but the term 'arms exports' generally refers to the financial value of the arms actually delivered; 'arms export licences' generally refers to the financial value of the licences for arms exports issued by the national export licensing authority; and 'arms export agreements' or 'arms export orders' refers to the financial value of contracts or other agreements signed for arms exports.

The arms export data for the states in table 9.10 is based on national definitions and methodologies and is thus not necessarily comparable. There is no internationally agreed definition of what constitutes 'arms' and governments use different lists when collecting and reporting data on the financial value of their arms exports. In addition, there is no standardized methodology concerning how to collect and report such data, with some states reporting on export licences issued or used and other states using data collected from customs agencies.

According to the SIPRI Arms Transfers Database, countries that produce official data on the financial value of their arms exports accounted for over 90 per cent of the total volume of deliveries of major arms. By adding together the data in table 9.10 it is therefore usually possible to attain a rough estimate of the financial value of the global arms trade. There are significant limitations in using this data to make such an estimate. First, as noted above, the data sets used are not directly comparable. Second, several states (e.g. the United Kingdom) do not release data on arms exports but only on arms export licences, while other states (e.g. China) do not release any data on either exports, licences, agreements or orders. Nonetheless, by adding together the data that states have made available on the financial value of their arms exports, as well as estimates for those that only provide data on arms export licences, agreements or orders—for earlier years when the latest data is not available—it is possible to estimate the total value of the global arms trade.

For 2018, part of the data for the United States, which generally accounts for around 25 per cent of the overall figure, had not been published at the time of writing. An estimate for 2018 is thus not possible. The estimate of the financial value of the global arms trade for 2017, the latest year for which US data is available, was at least \$95 billion.<sup>1</sup> However, the true figure is likely to be higher.
